

Vintage Poster by Toulouse Lautrec



The San Diego Museum of Art has this to say regarding Toulouse Lautrec's famous "Simpson Chain" advertisement:


The bicycle was all the rage in Paris in the 1890s, whether for sport or leisure.

Lautrec's poster for the bicycle chains made by the Simpson company shows a race scene involving teams of riders on machines with several saddles, as well as at least one rider cycling alone; the implication is perhaps that the Simpson chain gives one man the power of many. "L.B. Spoke" was the name of the bicycle store run by the Simpson representative in France, Louis Bouglé.

This is Lautrec's second try at the commission for Bouglé, and is more successful in every way than the initial design. He not only revised the chain to an accurate scale (responding to Bouglé's objection to the first proposal) but infused the scene with the excitement of a race, complete with band playing in the infield. The first attempt depicts a training scene, while here dozens of cyclists are buzzing around the track, hunching over in keen competition, with a feeling of energy and speed that by contrast makes Jimmy Michaël in the first design appear stationary. Lautrec added to the illusion of velocity by allowing some of the wheels to disappear into invisible spins. This second poster met with Bouglé's approval.

The Simpson Lever Chain riding cyclist drafting on the similarly equipped tandem is Constant Huret. The tandems are "quints", or five-seaters, which were popular as draft vehicles before the derny (motorized bicycle.) The men in centerfield are William Spears Simpson and Louis "Spoke" Bouglé.

The Simpson Chain or Simpson Lever Chain was an English-made bicycle chain invented by William Spiers Simpson in 1895. The design departed from the standard roller bicycle chain: it was composed of linked triangles forming two levels. The inner level was driven by the chainring and the outer drove the rear cog. Instead of teeth, the chainring and cog had grooves into which the rollers of the chain engaged.

Interview - Rochelle Wheeler

City of Alameda Senior Transportation Coordinator

Your newsletter editors met with Rochelle Wheeler in April to discuss issues relevant to Team Alameda members. Rochelle is the project manager for the city of Alameda as plans move forward for the Oakland-Alameda Estuary Bike/Pedestrian Bridge. There are many organizations involved as "stakeholders" in this project so we requested that Team Alameda be represented on the committee and she agreed.

At this point the bridge is still in the concept phase which involves creating a Project Initiation Document (PID) funded by Alameda County Measure BB to be completed in 2024. The bridge is one part of the Oakland/Alameda West End Access project which also includes improving tube access to 880 i.e. direct rather than through downtown Oakland.

Rochelle stated that the bike path through the Posey Tube will be widened to 4 feet by 2026 but that this was not a solution to the access problem for the West End of Alameda. She also confirmed that various mitigation strategies with respect to biking through the tube—one-way turnstiles, turbines to eliminate exhaust, baffling to reduce decibel levels—would be inadequate. Per Cal Trans, nothing more can be done to improve the tube. Hence the need for a bike/pedestrian bridge.

She reported that estimated usage of the tube is about 150 trips per day but that this would be expected to increase substantially if a bridge was available.

The timeline for the West End Access project is:

- Short term: improve the path through the tube
- Medium term: water shuttle
- Long term: bike/pedestrian bridge

This summer will begin a two-year privately funded pilot study for a water shuttle but she pointed to several problems with a water shuttle as a permanent solution such as limited hours of operation, availability not on demand, expense, and funding that could be problematic and vary from year to year.

With respect to the Estuary Bike/Pedestrian Bridge, Rochelle had the following information:

- No specific design yet
- No specific location yet
- Current concept envisions a 5% grade on the approach
- 600 foot span (approved by Coast Guard) would require a lift bridge (estimated cost \$200 million)
- 400 foot span would make a bascule bridge feasible (estimated cost somewhat less than \$200 million)

Most of the funding would be derived from federal coffers. There exists no confirmation about that aspect. City funds would be relatively limited.

We pointed out that a lengthy 5% grade approach could be problematic for non-e-bike riders though the opinion on the perceived steepness was split. Rochelle indicated they had not considered this potential issue and would appreciate input from Team Alameda going forward.

Rochelle also provided an update on the Clement/Tilden project on the other end of the island, highlighted in the Spring 23 newsletter. Either two bike lanes or a two-way bike lane will be added to the Miller-Sweeny bridge roadway. The abandoned railroad bridge should be demolished and a roundabout at the Tilden/Fernside intersection should be completed by 2025.

Team Alameda Away Ride in Santa Cruz

Ralph Bruni and Jack Pigott took the Main Street ferry from Alameda to South San Francisco, and biked from there to Half Moon Bay, where they met Laura Merchant, Ann McCormick, Dan Norton, and Klaus Schniedergers in time for lunch at the Sacrilege Brewery and Kitchen. From there, the group of six riders headed south towards Santa Cruz.

The sky was overcast, and a 15 mph tailwind pushed us along past the crashing surf, rocky promontories, and beaches with wet-suit clad surfers. Most of the route followed highway 1, but ride leader Ralph Bruni selected less busy side streets when possible. It was Friday, and traffic was light. We stopped at Pigeon Point lighthouse for a break and to see the sights, and looking south we saw that the marine layer was retreating and the sky was blue into Santa Cruz.

On Saturday, Ralph Bruni led the group of now eight riders on an excellent 48 mile tour of Santa Cruz and its environs. Further Notes on the Ride

The Main Street ferry, and much of public transport such as BART, can be used to advantage when planning a new ride. When Jack and I crossed the Bay in this fashion, we saved us downtown traffic on a weekday and some urban miles.

During the planning phase, we discovered overnight parking at a public beach in Half Moon Bay (HMB) is normally not allowed for a facility nominally reserved for day use only. Making a polite inquiry with the City of HMB avoided the prospect of parking overnight within HMB and Team Alameda was graciously provided overnight parking passes at a patrolled beach.

Upon my arrival from the ferry to Poplar Beach in HMB, I gave two Team Alameda T-shirts to Lisa Lopez Rossi, Administrative Services Director, in thanks for securing those passes, including one for the sheriff.

As Jack mentioned, some side streets were selected, away from Highway 1, to afford better scenery and safer passage, particularly to avoid some slanted railroad tracks in Davenport. By consensus, mine included, we all voted not to return by bicycle on Day 3. I look forward to Occidental, which promises to be another great club ride!

Riding to Treasure Island

It is a beautiful ride until you have to return up the final few hundred feet of a 17% grade to get back to the bridge. While definitely a challenge most experienced bikers (Team Alameda) can do it without great difficulty, not that it's exactly fun. A View From Treasure Island

Bike Path to San Francisco Via Treasure Island Is Only for the **Strong and Confident**

On the way over, we had rushed over the small mountain of Yerba Buena Island. The Bay Bridge freeway cuts through a tunnel in the heart of the hill, but the bike route - and the on- and off-ramps - circle up and over the mountain before dipping down to the flat sea level of Treasure Island. We were distracted by absolutely stunning views of San Francisco and the rush to find the event.

But on the way back, there was no distraction. The steep hill rose high in front of us. At the lower end, lovely new landscaping helped make a short set of switchbacks more enjoyable than the rest of the ride, which was just a steep uphill asphalt path next to the road. I had to walk; my fellow bike rider was able to stay on his pedals, but we traveled at the same pace.


Folks: it is steep. I went back again a few days later to check out the route all the way into the city (via ferry). My first impression - that this is not a hill for anyone not utterly confident that their brakes are in good working order - was confirmed when I encountered a bike rider standing off to the side pondering the way down. Ahead, Macalla Road curved away so steeply that it disappeared from sight. The rider was kitted out in bike gear; she had a highquality road bike; she looked prepared. But when I pulled up beside her, she said everything that had been on my mind since that first Saturday ride.

"I'm terrified," she said. "How did this get built? What were they thinking? San Francisco needs one or two people on staff who actually ride bikes so they can realize they need to build something better than this." She ended up turning back, refusing to go down the hill, even though the ferry to San Francisco was just right there.

It cannot be emphasized enough that this downhill onto Treasure Island is not for the faint of heart; it is not for cargo bikes or kids or families; it is definitely not for e-bikes with potential brake issues. If you're a confident hill bomber, have fun, but under no circumstances should you skip the ABC Quick Check (Air, Brakes, Crank and Chain, Quick releases, Quick ride) before heading out.

Take this warning seriously.

We encourage communicating with other members, sharing photos, coordinating rides and events, selling/buying gear and bikes, and everything else related to cycling and the club.


We recently used it very actively during our recent Santa Cruz away weekend.

Use https://discord.gg/4DCeWVRgUG to sign up. You can use iPhone or Android apps, or use a web browser.


Once you're on the "server", you can join any of the channels or chat with members directly.

Sign-Ups for Teamup



A useful feature on Teamup is the advance sign-up, signified by a black flag symbol. For longer rides or away rides, those potentially requiring car pools or simply for the RL to annotate the Ride Sheet in advance, this is a time-saving device. It will also indicate the level of interest for such a ride.

For those not familiar with how to use Signup, the Teamup website displays a series of graphics with relevant explanations. To keep things simple, only the most common functions have been transcribed; others have been adapted to our club rides:

With Teamup Calendar, you can enable signups for any event. If signups are enabled, anyone with access to the calendar event can sign up with their name and email address. The Ride Leader can easily see who has signed up.
